One of the most extensive and informative websites about child abuse and neglect, the site also offers in-depth information about the work being done at Tennyson Center for Children and the programs and services offered by the renowned Denver treatment center.

The new site launched in conjunction with the commencement of National Child Abuse Prevention month, which takes place each April. In addition to providing information on Tennyson Center and its mission, an entire section of the website deals with the prevention, recognition and reporting of child abuse, as well as providing numerous links to other agencies and government organizations dealing with abuse, neglect, missing children, parenting, child care and domestic violence.
