In this role, Dr. Arbour will manage the agency’s operational and support departments. Dr. Arbour was formerly the Chief Executive Officer of Rebuilding Together Metro Denver, a nonprofit that repairs and upgrades homes for the underserved.

Dr. Arbour has served as the Chair of the Board of Directors for Community Health Charities, Vice Chair of the Denver Commission on Aging’s Partnership Committee and as Committee Chairs for Easter Seals of Colorado’s Board of Directors. She has also volunteered with National Association of Women Business Owners and the Broomfield Chamber of Commerce.

Dr. Arbour received a PhD from University of Michigan, a master’s degree from Middlebury College and graduated Magna Cum Laude with a Bachelor of Arts from Elms College.
